IV. FACTS JUSTIFYING COURT ACTION

Children have been out of school since January 1982. Mother placed children for 30 days in June 1982 due to her hospitalization for psychiatric treatment. Since that time mother states she cannot control her children. Charles is allowed to stay out all night and his whereabouts are usually unknown to the mother. Family has had no electricity or water for 3-4 weeks. Family is without any financial assistance and is about to be evicted. Charges have been brought against mother by HISD for not sending either child to school. Mother cannot adequately provide for nor supervise her children.



school frustration and inconsistency with his academic performance add to his attitude and personal-social problems. He wants to be part of a group, but lacks the social skills in knowing how to interact with his peers. There were no signs of any delinquent oriented behavior.

The following recommendations are made:

1. Charles could benefit from a stable, nurturing environment where a behavior management system can be employed. Since he is a concrete thinker, explaining his limits and boundaries is of utmost importance. Short term goals are necessary as well as constantly keeping him on focus as to what he can learn.
2. Educationally, further investigation as to his classroom placement is needed. Contacting school officials as to previous special education placement and the possible need for basic academic classes should be explored.
3. Peer counseling would aid in Charles' ability to verbally express his feelings and begin to label them. He needs the interaction with others in his age group in order to develop better problem solving skills.

Charles was a quiet, somewhat withdrawn and depressed boy who spoke in a quiet manner. He stated that when he becomes angry he likes to talk to someone and when he is sad, he wants to stay by himself. Charles also indicated that he is a ninth grade student and did have some special education classes but could not remember when he was in them. Initially, he was somewhat reluctant and often stated that he could not do the tasks given to him because he did not know how to. There was a great deal of poor frustration tolerance and difficulty in handling difficult items.

METHOD OF EVALUATION

- Clinical interview
- Case file
- Human figure drawing
- Wide Range Achievement Test
- Thematic Apperception Test
- Sentence Completion

TEST RESULTS: Charles appears to be operating within the low average range of intellectual functioning with difficulty in verbal expression. On the WRAT, he performed at the 4.7 grade level in reading and at the 3.3 grade level in arithmetic. These scores are considerably low due to his present academic functioning.

Although exhibiting no problems with reality contact nor any signs of any thought disorder, Charles is reflecting a general mood of depression and concern about his future goals. His concerns center upon his family and his feelings of rejection and abandonment. He longs to be back in his family system again but does not quite know how to act. In addition, constant

Chuck's intellectual ability is suggested to be within the low average range.

His performance on the WISC-R earned a Verbal IQ of 80 and a Performance IQ of 96 for a Full Scale IQ of 87. The discrepancy between the Verbal IQ and the Performance is significant and cannot be fully explained based on this limited assessment. However, his lower verbal scores were on those tests most dependent on academic training (Information, Arithmetic, and Vocabulary). Perhaps inconsistent school attendance and a limited cultural environment could partially account for his significantly lower verbal skills. Reviewing school records for attendance could help in evaluating this hypothesis.


Chuck's academic skills are quite low, even when considering his verbal abilities. On the PIAT he performed at a third grade level in Mathematics (3.7), Reading Recognition (3.4), Reading Comprehension (3.1), and Spelling (3.5). Insufficient information is available to the examiner to determine the reason for his underachievement. Reviewing his school records may be helpful if there has been sporadic attendance, multiple changes in schools, consistent distractability or other discipline problems.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Based on this limited screening, Chuck would benefit by being in a setting that offers firm, clear, consistently enforced limits. Even in such an environment, Chuck is very likely to repeatedly test limits that are set.

A setting that offers some vocational training or active hands-on learning experiences could help Chuck focus his energy and perhaps minimize his distractability and tendency to be rather impatient.

Academically, Chuck will need remedial assistance. Because of his difficulty in focusing his attention, he is likely to perform better in small, highly structured classes. Short periods of study interspersed with active learning experiences could also be helpful.

 Chuck seemed to have difficulty sitting still for even the short length of time necessary for testing. He was distractable and repeatedly asked how much longer he would need to stay. 30)

 He seemed only moderately motivated to perform well. He did not show any evidence of being upset when he didn't know the answers to questions and at times he gave up easily. When encouraged, he would persist but seemed indifferent to whether or not he was ultimately successful. 31)

IDENTIFICATION:

Charles Raby is a 12-year-old white child of average height and weight. He originally came to TRIMS with his mother, Betty Perteet Butler, and his sister Wanda Raby on 5-14-82; at that interview his mother, who was severely depressed, was recommended for hospitalization, and Charles was placed in Depelchin Faith Home. He remained there until 6/26/82, when his mother brought him home. This intake was conducted when he came with his mother and sister for family therapy. They were half an hour late for the first session, during which he said little; he slept, snoring loudly, through the entire second session.

PRESENTING PROBLEM:

When the family came in in May, Mrs. Butler was clearly out of control of her children. Charles had been getting into fights in school in January and "just stopped going": His mother tried to make him go but couldn't, so she gave up. He is destructive in the house; he goes away for days; he comes in in the middle of the night with older friends and plays loud music; she is sure he is using drugs; he steals money from her purse; he fights and argues with his sister constantly. He has never been psysical violent with his mother, nor she with him. 34)

He had some problems at Depelchin Faith Home but was manaeable. When he first returned to live with his mother, she reported that things were all right; he spent most of his time at the local swimming pool. On the second visit, however, she reported a return of the old patterns of behavior. She said she was unable to cope with him and agreed to seek residential treatment for him, working with Cathy Rooth, a Child Protective Services worker assigned to her. As part of this placement, she was to bring him to see Dr. Ganc for a psychiatric evaluation.

FAMILY HISTORY:

At the time of this intake, and at the time of the initial interview, the family consisted of Betty, Charles and Wanda, and Betty's mother, Wanda Robinson, who had lived with the family for a year or more. Mrs. Robinson, a paranoid depressive, had recently been discharged from Center Pavilion Hospital, and was readmitted there shortly after her daughter was admitted. She came to live with her daughter again shortly before this intake.

Betty married Mr. Raby in May, 1969; Charles was born in March, 1970. She did not work outside the home when Charles was a baby. Mr. Raby deserted Betty when she was three months pregnant with Wanda; they were divorced in 1972 and she has not seen him for 10 years. According to Betty's report, she felt so bad when he left that she "didn't care

about anything or anybody," but her mother "made her have" Wanda. She had to go to work when Wanda was 11 days old. For a time she lived with her mother, but her mother "put her out" when Wanda was 2. She had to work 7 days a week to support herself and the children.

Betty married Mr. Butler, a man in his forties, in July, 1974 ("Him and my mother liked one another,"), at a time when she felt she needed help with the children and couldn't make it on her own. The children reportedly never got along with him; Betty's mother said he wasn't good for them. Though not normally violent, he once hit Wanda and bruised her; and Welfare was called once (it is not clear by whom) when he was hitting Charles outside. Betty sees the chief problem in the marriage as her being too "good-hearted": she took in her mother when no one else would; she took in her alcoholic 18-year-old drug-addicted brother; she was "too soft-hearted" to discipline the children. The couple separated in December, 1981; their divorce will be final at the end of June.

DRUG HISTORY:

The mother reports suspecting drug abuse for over a year. Charles often "acts funny," and sleeps a lot at odd times. 35)

EDUCATIONAL HISTORY:

Charles will be in the 3rd grade at Peter Janowski School in the fall. His mother says he's always had problems in school; he repeated both the 1st and 2nd grades. His biggest problems have been with math and spelling; he himself says he likes science best. He began in Coop School, then moved to Scarborough, then went back to Coop, and then to Peter Janowski. In the 4th grade, he was in a private learning center (?). 36)

DEVELOPMENTAL HISTORY:

Charles weighed 6 pounds 14½ ounces at birth. The pregnancy was normal, though his mother didn't see a doctor until she was 6 months pregnant. Developmental milestones were normal; he began to walk at 9 months. His mother reports that he has "no trouble making friends," and that he tends to associate with boys who are older than he is. 37)

MENTAL STATUS:

Since in all of his visits Charles was primarily either noncommunicative or asleep, it was difficult to assess his mental status. He is an attractive boy and looked neater than his sister Wanda. In the final intake session he did appear briefly interested when his personal developmental history was being discussed, and even contributed some information. As noted above, it appears that Charles's mother is unable to deal with Charles in any effective fashion. He has therefore been recommended for residential placement. 38/



DIAGNOSTIC FORMULATION:

The primary problem for this family is Betty Butler's inability to provide adequate parenting for the children—in particular, to exert any kind of control on their behavior. She appears to be an extremely dependent, needy, and nonassertive person who allows herself to be taken advantage of by others ("I just can't say no"); she becomes overburdened and then seeks out someone to take care of her. It appears that, rather than asking for help directly, she presents herself as unable to cope and expects the help to be forthcoming. When help is offered, she frequently sabotages it, e.g., arrangements are made for the children in order to give her time for herself, so she takes care of her sister's children during that time. It also appears that Betty is a member of an enmeshed chaotic family of origin; she and her mother are bound in a symbiotic relationship, and Wanda is being seen in this "weird" female pattern. Charles, by his increasingly outrageous behavior, is asking for external controls on it. At Depelchin Faith Home, he was able to respond to a structured environment; he is unlikely, however, to receive such structure from his mother, even with intensive work in therapy.

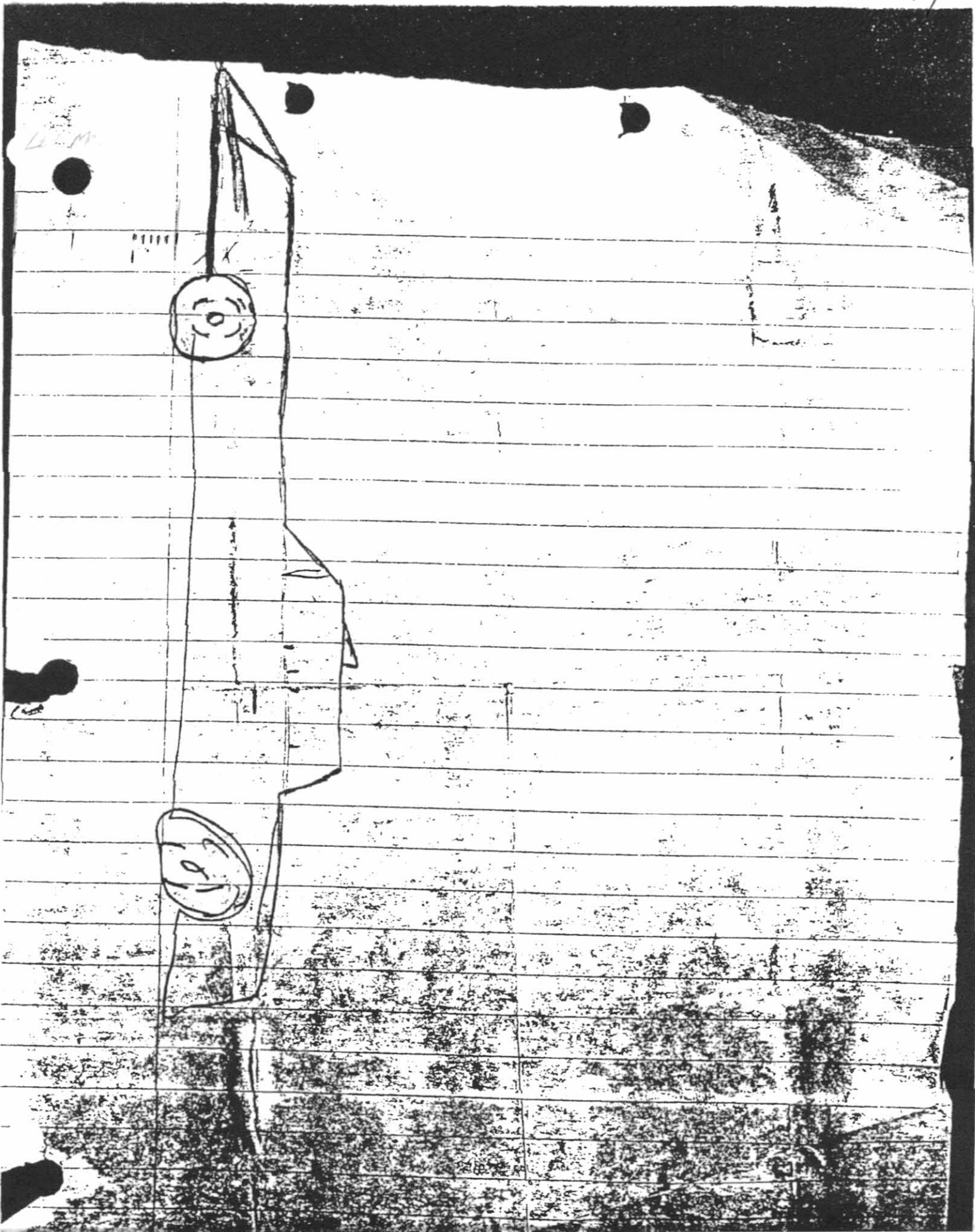

CHILD DICTATION

2/24/83: Staffing on new case (Charles Raby).

Results: A brief was given on how Charles originally came into care. Those present included the family service supervisor and worker that had been dealing w/the case. Also present was Betty Perteet, who is Charles' mother. Charles was brought into care because his mother could not control him in the home. He would not attend school, and had been known to use marijuana and alcohol. Charles' mother suffers from a nervous condition that made it extremely difficult for her to deal w/him. She also has been caring for her mother, who is currently an inpatient at the State Hosp in Austin. Ms. Perteet's mother suffers from schizophrenic condition. Ms. Perteet's illness, and other family problems have made it impossible for her to care for Charles at this time. Ms. Perteet is employed, and is currently living in her stepfather's home. She stated at the staffing that she had no objection to DHR receiving PMC of Charles. Ms. Perteet hopes that Charles will be able to return home once his placement at Woodside Trails ends.

Since his placement at Woodside Trails, Charles has run away once. He has a history of runaway behavior. He is street wise youth, who acts older than his age.

Assess: Charles is a youth who sounds as if he has problems. I will meet w/him, when I visit Woodside Trails next week.

3/1/83: Met w/Charles Raby at Woodside Trails.

Results: Charles kept a laid back profile, and did not reveal too much of himself to me during our interview. He responded to most of my questions w/short one sentence answers. Despite his quietness, I did not get the impression that Charles was unfriendly, however, he did seem somewhat suspicious. After talking w/him for about 1/2 hour, Charles began to ask a few questions. One of his main concerns was whether or not he would be allowed to go home due to his runaway incident when he stole the car. I told him that when Woodside Trails staff felt that he was ready to go home that I would assess the home situation and then decide whether or not he could go home. IDENTIFICATION:

Charles Raby is a 12-year-old white child of average height and weight. He originally came to PPH at his mother's home in Dept of Heller, WI. His sister Wanda Raby and 1-year-old son, interviewed by his mother, who is severely depressed, was present. The boy is in a state of denial, and Charles is placed in Department of Heller, WI. He remained there until 6/26/82, when his mother brought him home. He was severely distressed when he came home and his mother and sister had to be hospitalized. They were told an hour later for the first session. Charles said he had a fight with his mother, shouting loudly, through the entire session.

PRESENTING PROBLEM:

When the family came on in May, Mrs. Raby was clearly out of control with her children. Charles had been getting into fights in school in January and "just stopped going". His mother tried to take him to school but couldn't so she gave up. He is defiant, she in the evening he goes away for days he comes in in the middle of the night with other friends and plays to music; she is sure he is using drugs; he steals money from her purse; fights and argues with his sister constantly. He has never been violent with his mother, nor she with him.

He had some problems at Department of Heller home but was manageable. When he first returned to live with his mother, she reported that things were all right; he spent most of his time at the local swimming pool. On a second visit, however, she reported a return of the old patterns of behavior. She said she was unable to cope with him and agreed to seek residential treatment for him, working with Cathy Booth, a Child Protection Services worker assigned to her. As part of this placement, she was to bring him to see Dr. Ganc for a psychiatric evaluation.

FAMILY HISTORY:

At the time of this intake, and at the time of the initial interview, the family consisted of Betty, Charles and Wanda, and Betty's mother, Wanda Robinson, who had lived with the family for a year or more. Mrs. Robinson, a paranoid depressive, had recently been discharged from Gen Pavilion Hospital, and was readmitted there shortly after her daughter was admitted. She came to live with her daughter again shortly before this intake.

Betty married Mr. Raby in May, 1969; Charles was born in March, 1970. She did not work outside the home when Charles was a baby. Mr. Raby deserted Betty when she was three months pregnant with Wanda; they were divorced in 1972 and she has not seen him for 10 years. According to Betty's report, she has not seen him for 10 years.
